HISTORY

Initiated in 2003, the PHS Athletic Hall of Fame was established to formally perpetuate the memory of those athletes, teams, coaches, and supporters who have brought distinction, honor, and excellence to athletics at Princeton High School.

CATEGORIES OF ELIGIBLE NOMINEES

Student-Athletes will be eligible for consideration five years after graduation. Candidates must have demonstrated athletic accomplishments that represent the highest level of achievement for their era of competition.

Athletic Teams may be considered for recognition five years after completion of the relevant season. Teams that displayed extraordinary performances and had outstanding seasons will be eligible in this category.

Coaches will be eligible for consideration five years after retiring from coaching at Princeton High School. Candidates must have made outstanding contributions to the field of athletics and provided exemplary leadership to the student-athletes of Princeton High School.

Special Honorary Contributors will be considered for recognition at the discretion of the selection committee. Candidates will have made outstanding contributions and/or offered extraordinary services to the student-athletes at Princeton High School.



Michelle Bazile '14

Michelle Bazile was recruited by Brown University's athletic department after four successful years as a Track and Field athlete at Princeton High School, which included winning the gold medal in the Shot Put at the NJSIAA Meet of Champions in 2014. She was also named The Times' Female Track Athlete of the Year to go along with 1st team All-State recognition from the Star-Ledger/nj.com. Michelle is one of only two female athletes in school history to win a Meet of Champions title. Additionally, she won the Group III State title in the Shot Put as a senior. She was also an accomplished Discus thrower, with a top finish of 2nd place in the Meet of Champions as a junior.



On the local level, Michelle won three consecutive Mercer County titles in the Shot Put during the spring seasons of 2012-14, to go along with back-to-back victories in the same event at the county championship during the winters of her junior and senior years. She was a two-time Mercer County Discus champion. Additionally, she swept the gold medals in the Shot Put and Discus at the NJSIAA Central Jersey III Sectionals in the spring of her junior and senior seasons. Michelle is the current PHS school record holder in both the Shot Put (43'9) and the Discus (139'3). She graduated from Brown University in 2018 with two undergraduate degrees in Biology and Ethnomusicology. She is currently working on her Master's degree in Business Administration with a concentration in music business.

During her time at PHS, she played bass for the Princeton High School Studio Band for three years and has continued refining her musical skills through her professional career as a touring bassist for various R&B, Neo-Soul, Hip-Hop, Jazz, Metal, Indie and Folk bands in NYC, Washington DC, Philadelphia, New Jersey, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Massachusetts and Vermont. Her current passions include studying jazz guitar, riding motorcycles and devouring Mancini's Woodfired Pizza.

Pete Nichols '74

As a sophomore, Pete Nichols decided to try out for Princeton High School's cross country team. Pete earned a place on the school's varsity team for which he scored in every competition. He continued running on the school's varsity winter and spring track teams and came close to establishing a two-mile school record in his first year of running.


Realizing that dedication and hard work were keys to success, Pete ran on weekends and over the summer. The extra work returned rewards in his junior year, when he established school records for cross country and the two-mile track event. In his senior year, Pete and his XC73 teammates set off to be a premier cross country team; a dream they had discussed since sophomore year. Along with co-captain John Woodside, Pete led the team to a 16-0 dual meet record, which secured the Mercer County League title; the team also won the Mercer County championship meet as well as the Central Jersey Group 3 title. Over the course of the team's dream season, Pete led what The Evening Times of Trenton termed "an unmerciful assault on the record books" by establishing eight course records in the team's nine meets away from home. At the time, Coach Larry Ivan was quoted (in The Evening Times) as calling Pete "the best runner I've ever had."

In addition to being a captain of the PHS cross country team, Pete was co-captain of the school's winter track teams in both his junior and senior years. In both years, he was the recipient of PHS's most valuable runner award, and he won all-county and all-area honors in cross country and track.

Outside of PHS, Pete was a member of two Shore AC track teams that set world records for the 100-mile relay. In his senior year, Pete ran the Philadelphia Marathon and placed 10th overall.

Pete attended Denison University where he ran on the school's cross country and track teams; he was the school's top distance runner from his first day on campus and captained its cross country team.

Pete continues to enjoy running, and always encourages others (especially family) to join in the fun.



Allen Bryant '10

During his time at Princeton High School, Allen enjoyed participating in athletics all seasons of his 4-year tenure. As a freshman, Allen played football and lacrosse while running indoor track in the winter. After an injury stopped his football career, Allen picked up soccer after an 8-year hiatus.

On the soccer field, Allen started off as a goalie but quickly transitioned to defense where he could use his size and speed as a part of an already outstanding defensive unit. During his senior year, Allen helped the soccer team go undefeated – allowing only 7 goals total in 25 games on its way to winning the Mercer County Championship and Group 3 state championship where he scored the game winning goal off a corner kick. The same year he was awarded 2nd Team All South Jersey and 3rd Team All Group 3.

On the track, Allen ran the 400M and 200M with a personal best of 53.0 and 23.1 seconds, respectively. He was part of a 4x400M team that placed 6th in the Group 3 state championship and earned a spot at the "Meet of Champions".

On the lacrosse field, Allen scored his first varsity goal as a freshman and became a starting midfielder his sophomore year. Allen scored a PHS record of 68 goals his senior year and helped the team get to the Group 3 State Title Game during a school record tying 17-win season. During his PHS lacrosse career, Allen scored over 100 goals, was named All-American, 1st Team All-State, CVC Player of the Year, 2 x 1st Team All-CVC.

Allen graduated from Vanderbilt University and has remained active in athletics as a board member and participant of the D10 Decathlon, a fundraiser for pediatric cancer research that expanded to 10 cities across the nation. Allen currently resides in NYC where he runs an impact-focused venture capital firm. Allen is grateful for the spectacular coaches and staff that helped shape him during this time and beyond and the longstanding friendships built with teammates alongside the support of his parents Ann & Gordon and Aunt Margee.



Greg Hand




In 1985 Greg began a 29-year teaching and coaching career, during which he coached PHS teams for a total of 70 seasons in three sports.

Soccer: After 3 seasons with the JV boys, Greg coached girls' varsity soccer for the next twenty-four, with a cumulative record of 242-170-20, including 17 winning seasons. The 2012 team won PHS's first-ever sectional championship in girls' soccer. Greg was twice selected Coach of the Year by the Mercer County Girls Soccer Coaches Assn., and several times as coach of the season by local sportswriters. He received the CVC Sportsmanship Award in 2007.

Swimming: Greg coached the girls' and boys' swimming teams for eighteen seasons. The **girls'** cumulative record was 152-63-1. During the last 11 years, they won their CVC division 11 times, earned 2 Mercer County and 8 sectional titles, and were state finalists 4 times. The **boys** achieved an overall record of 211-46-1, winning 17 CVC divisional championships, 7 Mercer County titles, 12 sectional titles, 5 state finals appearances, and a state championship (2012), which earned a #1 year-end ranking in New Jersey. The NJSIAA selected him for 3 swimming awards: the Award of Honor (2003), and twice NJ Coach of the Year (boys 2004, girls 2007). In 2004 the NFHS awarded him Boys Swimming Coach of the Year for the Northeast U.S., and in 2011, the Star Ledger named him State Coach of the Year for boys swimming.

Track and Field: Greg was assistant track coach for the throwing events for 25 seasons. New to these events, he was rewarded with the commitment of hundreds of student-athletes who learned with him. Over the years, they contributed to the success of PHS track teams at all levels of competition.

Bill Alden



A lawyer turned journalist, Bill Alden started covering Princeton-area sports in 1995 on a part-time basis for the Princeton Packet.

After living in London from 1999-2002, Bill returned to Princeton and became the sports editor of the Town Topics. In that role, he started covering Princeton High sports along with Princeton Day School, Hun School, Stuart Country Day School, and Princeton University.

While enjoying writing about each of those schools, PHS athletics has provided

Bill with some the highlights of his sports writing career, including covering the 2009 and 2012 PHS boys' state soccer championship teams, the 2012 Tiger boys' swimming state championship squad, and 2021 girls' soccer team's run to the state final. Season after season, Bill has chronicled the ups and downs of the Tiger teams with coverage of football, field hockey, soccer, tennis, volleyball, cross country, ice hockey, basketball, swimming, wrestling, lacrosse, baseball, softball, track, and golf.

In addition to being on hand for championship battles and regular season clashes, Bill has relished getting wisdom over the years from such legendary PHS coaches as Greg Hand, Wayne Sutcliffe, Peter Stanton, and Joyce Jones, among others. In the last 21 years, he has interviewed hundreds of Tiger athletes who have enhanced his stories with their insight.

During his time at the Princeton Packet and Town Topics, Bill has received 15 sports writing awards from the New Jersey Society of Professional Journalists and the New Jersey Press Association. His work has also appeared in the *Washington Post* and *New York Newsday*.

A native of McLean, Va., Bill earned degrees from Amherst College, Washington and Lee Law School, and the New York University Graduate School of Arts and Sciences.

He lives in Princeton with his wife, Susan, and they have two adult daughters, Maddie (PHS 2011) and Katie, who currently reside in New York City and Philadelphia, respectively.

Carl Lutz '31

Carl Lutz '31, played during "the golden age of PHS sports." As a senior, he was captain of the basketball team that won the Class B state title in 1931. Over the course of 5 games in the 1931 state tournament, Lutz scored a state-high 63 points. For the season, he finished 3rd in scoring amongst Class B Schools and 5th overall in the state with 206 points.



Following the season, the Trenton Sunday Times-Advertiser placed him on their All-State First Team (which included all 165 high school & prep schools in NJ), as well as First Team All-State Class B, First Team All-Central Jersey and First Team All-Region. The Trenton Evening Times newspaper also placed him on First-Team All-State Class B and noted that he was considered one of the "finest forwards in the state". Following his junior year in basketball, Lutz earned Honorable Mention All-State Class B recognition.

He also played football for four years, winning sectional division championships in three years. His running and passing contributed to his team's success. Following his senior football season, Lutz was named First-Team All-State Class B and Honorable Mention All-Groups by the Trenton Evening Times for his exploits at Fullback. As a junior he received Honorable Mention All-State Class B recognition and after his sophomore year he made the All-South Jersey Second Team.

He also played baseball and ran track during his time at PHS.

Following graduation from PHS, Carl attended the Hun School, playing football and rowing. He rowed in the Henley Regatta in 1933. He attended Princeton University for one year, playing football and rowing. During WW2, he commanded an anti-aircraft battery in the Pacific theater. After the war, he married his wife Peggy and had four children. He stayed in the Army and retired after 23 years of service. He died in 2011 and is buried at Arlington National Cemetery.

1931 BOYS' BASKETBALL TEAM

The 1930-1931 Boys Basketball Team captured the school's first state title by winning the 1931 Class B Championship. Following the completion of the regular season, Coach George Tindall's PHS quintet defeated Pennington, Pt. Pleasant and Manasquan to capture the Central Jersey Sectional Championship. The team then advanced to the state semifinals which were played in the Convention Hall in Asbury Park. In the semifinal, PHS defeated Keyport 30-24 and was led by senior Captain Carl Lutz (11 points) and junior John Tindall (8 points - No relation to the coach).

The championship game was held the very next evening (again in Asbury Park) and the Little Tigers faced off against an undefeated squad from Caldwell. Down four points at the end of the first quarter, PHS held Caldwell scoreless in the decisive 2nd quarter to rally and never looked back as they won 20-16 and captured the state title. Five PHS players scored in the game led by Tindall with 6 and Lutz (who was double-teamed all evening) with 5 points. In that era, every made basket was followed by a center tip at mid-court and was one of the reasons for the low-scoring contests. Senior Lutz scored a state high 63 points over the course of the 5 state tournament games. Besides Lutz and Tindall, the team's starters were Randolph "Bud" Applegate, Leroy "Roy" Page and Joe Richards.

After the season, several PHS players received postseason accolades. Carl Lutz received multiple first-team all-state nominations and was considered one of the finest forwards in the state. John "Johnny" Tindall also received all-state recognition as did fellow junior Applegate and senior Page. Other members of the team were seniors Richards, Rudolph "Rudy" Ehart and William "Bill" Saunders (Sanders), as well as juniors Pete Marx and Harry Caplan. Team Manager was Bill Stonaker.

Princeton High School 2012 Swim Team

The 2011-12 boys' swimming team ended its season with an astonishing championship meet. The next day's Star-Ledger summed it up well:

"It was, by far, the best overall team performance the NJSIAA tournament has seen in a very long time. Princeton scored an astronomical 4,976 power points, broke eight team records and posted 17 personal bests in a 109-61 victory over defending champion Scotch Plains-Fanwood for its first Public B state title. Christian Brothers Academy entered the season No. 1 and remained unbeaten through the state final for the Non-Public A title. But Princeton, the Star-Ledger Top 20 Trophy winner as the No. 1 team in the state, took over the top spot after it dispatched Scotch Plains. In a match of championship meet times, Princeton would have defeated CBA, 96-74." (4/1/12)

But that was not the whole story of this remarkable season, or of this team. Showing exceptional unity, leadership, sense of purpose and class, they rolled to a 17-0 dual meet record and won the Mercer County Championship, taking first in 9 of 11 events and setting county records in two relays (including the 4x100 freestyle relay by 6.1 seconds).

As great classes do, the senior class of 2012 had an enormous impact during their prior years, as did the 2012 underclassmen in both their earlier and subsequent years. From 2009-2012, the seniors' record, including regular season and postseason meets, was 59-8, with four CVC titles, 2 Mercer County championships, 4 Central Section B championships, 2 Group B semifinal wins, and the 2012 state championship. The talented underclassmen of 2012, along with solid newcomers, were again sectional champions in 2013 and lost their state semifinal by .1 second, while in 2014 they earned a state final berth again and lost in a terrific meet, 87-83.

The 2012 boys swimming team was excellent in every respect that a community could hope to see in its student athletes. They have earned their place in PHS lore, and in the PHS Athletic Hall of Fame.




